## 1. INFORMATION ON TENDERING

## 1.1. Participation

Participation in this tender procedure is open on equal terms to all natural and legal persons coming within the scope of the Treaties and to all natural and legal persons in a third country which has a special agreement with the Union in the field of public procurement on the conditions laid down in that agreement. Where the Multilateral Agreement on Government Procurement<sup>1</sup> concluded within the WTO applies, the participation to the call for tenders is also open to nationals of the countries that have ratified this Agreement, on the conditions it lays down.

#### **1.2.** Contractual conditions

The tenderer should bear in mind the contract provisions which specify the rights and obligations of the contractor, particularly those on payments, performance of the contract, confidentiality, and checks and audits.

#### **1.3.** Joint tenders

A joint tender is a situation where a tender is submitted by a group of economic operators (consortium). Joint tenders may include subcontractors in addition to the joint tenderers.

In case of joint tender, all economic operators in a joint tender assume joint and several liability towards the Contracting Authority for the performance of the contract as a whole.

These economic operators shall designate one of them to act as leader with full authority to bind the grouping or the consortium and each of its members. It shall be responsible for the receipt and processing of payments for members of the grouping, for managing the service administration and for coordination. The composition and constitution of the grouping or consortium, and the allocation of the scope of tasks amongst the members, shall not be altered without the prior written consent of the Commission.

The tenderers should indicate in their offer whether the partnership takes the form of:

- a) <u>a new or existing legal entity</u> which will sign the contract with the Commission in case of award
- or
- b) a group of partners not constituting a new legal entity, who via a power of attorney, signed by an authorised representative of each partner (except the lead partner), designate one of the partners as lead partner, and mandate him as lead contractor to sign the contract with the Commission in case of award.

#### 1.4. Subcontracting

Subcontracting is permitted in the tender but the contractor will retain full liability towards the Contracting Authority for performance of the contract as a whole.

Tenderers must give an indication of the part of the services and proportion of the contract that they intend to subcontract.

Tenderers are required to identify subcontractors whose share of the contract is above 20%.

During contract execution, the change of any subcontractor identified in the tender will be subject to prior written approval of the Contracting Authority.

#### **1.5.** Content of the tender

The tenders must be presented as follows:

- Part A: Identification of the tenderer (see section 1.6)
- Part B: Evidence for exclusion criteria (see section 2.2)
- Part C: Evidence for selection criteria (see section 2.3)

Part D: Technical offer (see section 2.5)

Part E: Financial offer (see section 2.6)

Part F: Power of attorney (for consortia only)

#### **1.6.** Identification of the tenderer: legal capacity and status

- The tenderer's identification form in **Annex 1** shall be filled in and signed by:
  - The tenderer (including any member of a consortium or grouping)
  - $\circ$  subcontractor(s) whose share of the work represent more than 20% of the contract.
- In order to prove their legal capacity and their status, all tenderers (including any member of a consortium or grouping) must provide a signed Legal Entity Form with its supporting evidence. The form is available on:

Tenderers that are already registered in the Contracting Authority's accounting system (i.e. they have already been direct contractors) must provide the form but are not obliged to provide the supporting evidence.

• If it has not been included with the Legal Entity Form, tenderers must provide the following information:

- For legal persons, a legible copy of the notice of appointment of the **persons authorised to represent the tenderer** in dealings with third parties and in legal proceedings, or a copy of the publication of such appointment if the legislation which applies to the legal entity concerned requires such publication. Any delegation of this authorisation to another representative not indicated in the official appointment must be evidenced.
- For natural persons, where applicable, a proof of registration on a professional or trade register or any other official document showing the registration number.
- The tenderer (only the leader in case of joint tender) must provide a **Financial Identification Form and supporting documents**. The form is available on:

## 2. EVALUATION AND AWARD

#### 2.1. Evaluation steps

The evaluation is based on the information provided in the submitted tender. It takes place in three steps:

- (1) Verification of non-exclusion of tenderers on the basis of the exclusion criteria
- (2) Selection of tenderers on the basis of selection criteria
- (3) Evaluation of tenders on the basis of the award criteria (technical and financial evaluation)

Only tenders meeting the requirements of one step will pass on to the next step.

#### 2.2. Exclusion criteria

All tenderers shall provide a declaration on their honour (see Annex 2), duly signed and dated by an authorised representative, stating that they are not in one of the situations of exclusion listed in the Annex 2.

The declaration on honour is also required for identified subcontractors whose intended share of the contract is above 20%.

The successful tenderer shall provide the documents mentioned as supporting evidence in Annex 2 before signature of the contract and within a deadline given by the contracting authority. This requirement applies to all members of the consortium in case of joint tender. In case of doubt on this declaration on the honour, the contracting authority may also request the evidence for subcontractors whose intended share of the contract is above 20%.

#### 2.3. Selection criteria

Tenderers must prove their economic, financial, technical and professional capacity to carry out the work subject to this call for tenders.

The tenderer may rely on the capacities of other entities, regardless of the legal nature of the links which it has with them. It must in that case prove to the Contracting Authority that it will have at its disposal the resources necessary for performance of the contract, for example by producing an undertaking on the part of those entities to place those resources at its disposal.

#### 2.3.1. Economic and financial capacity criteria and evidence

In order to prove their economic and financial capacity, the tenderer (i.e. in case of joint tender, the combined capacity of all members of the consortium) must comply with the following criteria:

- The annual turnover of the last two financial years must have been above €200.000

The following evidence should be provided:

- Copy of the profit & loss account for the last two years for which accounts have been closed,
- Failing that, appropriate statements from banks,

If, for some exceptional reason which the Contracting Authority considers justified, a tenderer is unable to provide one or other of the above documents, he or she may prove his or her economic and financial capacity by any other document which the Contracting Authority considers appropriate. In any case, the Contracting Authority must at least be notified of the exceptional reason and its justification in the tender. The Commission reserves the right to request any other document enabling it to verify the tenderer's economic and financial capacity.

#### 2.3.2. <u>Technical and professional capacity criteria and evidence</u>

#### a. Criteria relating to tenderers

Tenderers (in case of a joint tender the combined capacity of all tenderers and identified subcontractors) must comply with the following criteria:

- The tenderer must prove experience with and in-depth understanding of EU and/ or EEA and/ or EFTA and/ or Energy Community countries' certification schemes, or equivalent qualification schemes for installers of small RES technologies, covering aspects such as legislation, functioning, measures affecting the operation of such schemes in electricity, including heating and cooling, with at least three projects delivered (or completed) in the last three years, with a minimum value for each project of €70 000, the projects must, in combination, cover all the aspects mentioned.

- The tenderer must prove experience of working in at least 12 EU and/or EEA and / or EFTA and/or Energy Community official languages with at least two projects delivered (completed) in the last three years, the projects in combination showing the necessary language coverage.
- -The tenderer must prove experience of working on RES policies and related certification schemes, or equivalent qualification schemes for installers of small RES technologies in at least 12 EU Member States (both old and new Member States that joined 2004) with at least two projects delivered (completed) in the last three years, the combination of the projects must show the necessary geographical coverage. For these 12 Member States, the tenderer must prove experience in comparative legal and policy analysis on renewable energy sector, particularly certification schemes or equivalent qualification schemes, and experience in drafting high-quality reports and recommendations.

#### **b.** Criteria relating to the team delivering the service:

The team delivering the service should include, as a minimum, the following four profiles:

#### Project Manager:

At least five years' experience in project management, including overseeing project delivery, quality control of delivered service, client orientation and conflict resolution experience in project of a similar size (at least  $\notin$  100,000) and coverage (at least twelve Member States), with experience in management of team of at least ten people.

# At least two experts in certification schemes or equivalent qualification schemes for RES installers of small-scale RES technologies:

Relevant higher education degree in economics, law, environmental science, educational sciences or an equivalent field and at least five years' professional experience in the field of renewable energy, particularly certification schemes or equivalent qualification schemes.

#### At least one webmaster:

University degree in computer science or an equivalent field and at least five years' professional experience in web creation, development and maintenance.

#### The team collectively:

The team should also have the capacity to access and master all the knowledge needed (statistics, composition of the energy system, legal databases etc.) of the 28 EU Member States, EEA EFTA and Energy Community countries in order to perform the work required.

The team must be able to take over, maintain and develop a website as a communication tool used by both public and private stakeholders that need up to date information about certification schemes or equivalent qualification schemes of small-scale RES technologies of the 28 Member States, EEA, EFTA and the Energy Community signatories, but also about their grid and administrative issues that renewable energy faces.

#### Language quality check:

The team must prove capacity to draft concise text for web and online reports in high quality English.

#### c. Evidence:

The following evidence should be provided to fulfil the above criteria:

- List of relevant services provided in the past three years, with sums, dates and recipients, public or private. The most important services shall be accompanied by certificates of satisfactory execution, specifying that they have been carried out in a professional manner and have been fully completed;
- The educational and professional qualifications of the persons who will provide the service for this tender (CVs) including the management staff. Each CV provided should indicate the intended function in the delivery of the service, as well as the function held in the previous projects.

#### 2.4. Award criteria

The tender will be awarded according to the best-value-for-money procedure. The quality of the tender will be evaluated based on the following criteria. The maximum total quality score is 100 points.

• **Quality of the proposed methodology** (60 points – minimum threshold 60%)

This criterion will assess the approach for implementing the work, the adequacy of information, data collection and analysis techniques and the methodology for maintaining the online database, as well as the methodology for analysing the legal, financial and regulatory framework of certification schemes or equivalent qualification schemes for installers of small-scale RES technologies.

The score will be attributed as follows:

- Methodology for developing and maintaining the database: the primary emphasis is on the approach to the tasks as described in points 3.3 (2) and 3.7 (3), from the point of view of adequate and full coverage of all aspects listed in the introductory part of point 3.3 - up to 25 points

- Methodology for gathering the information, analysing, etc, the legal, financial and regulatory framework relevant for certification schemes or equivalent qualification schemes for installers of small-scale RES technologies in all EU Member States, EEA, EFTA and Energy Community countries – up to 35 points. The primary emphasis is on the approach to the tasks as described in point 3.3 (3), from the point of view of adequate and full coverage of all aspects listed in the introductory part of point 3.3

• **Organisation of the work** (20 points – minimum threshold 60%)


This criterion will assess how the roles and responsibilities of the proposed team and of the economic operators (in case of joint tenders, including subcontractors if applicable) are distributed for each task. It also assesses the global allocation of time and resources to the project and to each task or deliverable, and whether this allocation is adequate for the work. The tender should provide details on the allocation of time and resources and the rationale behind the choice of this allocation.

• **Quality control measures** (20 points – minimum threshold 60%)

This criterion will assess the quality control system applied to the service foreseen in these tender specifications concerning the quality of the deliverables, the language quality check, and continuity of the service in case of absence of the member of the team. The quality system should be detailed in the tender and specific to the tasks at hand; a generic quality system will result in a low score.

Tenders must score minimum 60% for each criterion and minimum 70 points in total. Tenders that do not reach the minimum quality thresholds will be rejected and will not be ranked.

After evaluation of the quality of the tender, the tenders are ranked according to the following formula (a weight 70/30 is put to quality/price):



#### 2.5. Technical offer

The technical offer must cover all aspects and tasks required in the technical specifications and provide all the information needed to apply the award criteria. Offers deviating from the requirements or not covering all requirements may be excluded on the basis of nonconformity with the tender specifications and not evaluated.

#### 2.6. Financial offer

The price for the tender must be quoted in euro. Tenderers from countries outside the euro zone have to quote their prices in euro. The price quoted may not be revised in line with exchange rate movements. It is for the tenderer to assume the risks or the benefits deriving from any variation.

Prices must be quoted free of all duties, taxes and other charges, including VAT, as the European Union is exempt from such charges under Articles 3 and 4 of the Protocol on the privileges and immunities of the European Union. The amount of VAT may be shown separately.

The quoted price must be a fixed amount which includes all charges (including travel and subsistence). Travel and subsistence expenses are not refundable separately. The maximum work is evaluated at around 150 man-days. The maximum budget for the contract has been estimated as 150 000 euros. Offers exceeding this amount will be excluded from further evaluation.

## 3. TECHNICAL SPECIFICATIONS

#### 3.1. Background

Since 1997, the Community has had a policy of promoting renewable energy, founded on the need to address sustainability concerns surrounding climate change and air pollution, improve the security of Europe's energy supply and develop Europe's competitiveness in industrial and technological innovation. The Community has several pieces of legislation covering the sector, most importantly Directive 2009/28/EC on the promotion of the use of energy from renewable energy sources.<sup>2</sup> The renewable energy share at EU level has increased constantly, including the share of prosumers, creating the need to improve the information and training gaps regarding those professionals installing the equipment producing renewable energy in the electricity and heating and cooling sectors, particularly at household level. It has become more visible that the efficiency and quality of renewable energy systems and equipment depends not only on the technology, but very strongly also on the quality of planning, design and installation of the whole system.

The Renewable Energy Directive acknowledged this need by asking Member States in Art 14(2) to ensure that certification schemes or equivalent qualification schemes are made available by 31 December 2012 for installers of small-scale RES technologies, namely, biomass boilers and stoves, solar photovoltaic and solar thermal systems, shallow geothermal systems and heat pumps. These schemes may take into account already existing schemes and structures and shall be based on the criteria laid down in Annex IV of the Directive. Member States are also required to recognise certification awarded by other Member States in accordance with the criteria of Annex IV.

However, as Recitals 50 and 51 of the Directive state, it does not aim at regulating the mutual recognition of installers in different EU Member States and it does not affect the application of Directive 2005/36/EC on the recognition of professional qualifications. Nevertheless, Art 14(3) aims to enable the development of common standards for installers, to provide assurances to consumers about the quality of installations and increase consumers' confidence. Member States are thus required to make available public information on their certification or equivalent qualification schemes. They may also make available the list of installers qualified of certified in accordance with the provisions of the RES Directive.

To support all these actions, the Commission is proposing this study to maintain a publicly accessible (web-based) database of key national measures on certification schemes or equivalent qualification schemes for installers of small-scale RES technologies, including a detailed and exhaustive database of the respective schemes for the technologies listed in the Renewable Energy Directive, as well as the market access regime and recognition for installers from another Member State in each Member State, EEA, EFTA and the Energy Community countries.

The database would be updated on a continuous basis and would support the Commission's monitoring responsibility as well as serve as a publicly available information source The creation and maintenance of such a database also provides the Commission with up to date information for briefings and its analytical work. It will provide a common and coherent basis for providing information to a wide range of public stakeholders, including consumers and suppliers, Member States authorities, potential investors or researchers. In particular, industry or individual households interested in developing renewable energy resources will be able to easily access information to help them plan and finance such developments.

Such database would facilitate access to information on the installer certification rules and mutual recognition systems available in all Member States.

#### 3.2. Objectives

The objective of this study is to provide and maintain a thorough and regularly updated webbased database of certification schemes or equivalent qualification schemes for installers of small-scale RES technologies, in particular covering the criteria of Annex IV of the Directive, for each Member State of the EU, EEA, EFTA and Energy Community countries. It will also outline the contact details of national/regional certification bodies and the national rules on mutual recognition.

#### 3.3. Tasks

- 1. Gathering detailed information from EU Member States, EEA, EFTA and Energy Community governments or other reliable sources on all the policy measures related to certification schemes or equivalent qualification schemes for installers of small-scale RES technologies that are presently in force. The information provided by the database should include at minimum and in great detail the following aspects, in a consumer friendly, synthetic manner:
  - the duration of certification,
  - the technology covered,
  - the subject of certification/qualification (individuals/companies),
  - information on procedures: certification requirements, requirements for renewing, certification fees and costs, length of training
  - required competences (design/installation/commissioning) for the training
  - the relation between eligibility for support schemes for RES and certification/qualification whether nationally obtained or following mutual recognition
  - the mutual recognition rules in force in every state mentioned above
  - the duration of the contact details of the national/regional entities responsible for granting such recognition
  - the European Qualification Framework level for the respective schemes, if such level available

- the information on procedures to fulfil, documents required for obtaining mutual recognition in each state covered by the scope of this tender
- national contact points for this matter, if existing
- public available list of certified installers
- 2. Setting up and maintaining the user friendly publicly available web-based database for containing the above information, clearly covering all 28 Member States as well as EEA, EFTA and the Energy Community countries. Continuously updating it with developments in the field of certification schemes or equivalent qualification schemes for installers of small-scale RES technologies or market access measures for renewable energy installers (following national revisions, adjustments and reforms) in the countries covered by the scope of this tender.
- 3. Providing an assessment report on the current state of play of the implementation of provisions of Article 14 (3) and (4) of the Directive in the countries covered by the scope of this tender, with a special focus on the 28 Member States, based on the information gathered during the fulfilment of the tasks above. The report should critically analyse the delivery and achievement of the scope of Article 14(3) and (4), in particular the mutual recognition framework applied by Member States. It should also identify burdens, inconsistencies, gaps or ineffective measures of the system set up by Article 14(3) and (4) of the Renewable Energy Directive. An analysis of the harmonisation potential of the respective provisions should also be included.

A synthetic comparison of the competences covered by the certification/qualification schemes in the 28 Member States should be prepared and included in the report.

Best practices and recommendations for improvement of the mutual recognition system as well as of the installers' certification system as a whole should also be included.

#### **3.4.** Key Documents

In order to facilitate the work, the Commission is providing the tenderer with the following relevant documents and websites, but not limited to:

The winning tenderer will have to update the above list with any legally binding or nonbinding measures that will be adopted by the EU or by the Commission until the end of the contract.

#### 3.5. Duration

The duration of the tasks shall not exceed 24 months. This period is calculated in calendar days.

Execution of the tasks begins after the date on which the contract enters into force.

In principle, the deadlines set out below cannot be extended. The contractor is deemed solely responsible for delays occasioned by subcontractors or other third parties (except for rare cases of *force majeure*). Adequate resources and appropriate organisation of the work including management of potential delays should be put in place in order to observe the timetable below.

#### **3.6.** Meetings

A kick-off meeting will be held in Brussels no later than 15 working days after the entry into force of the contract to discuss the project in detail.

A coordination meeting with the Commission in Brussels will be organized after twelve months after the entry into force of the contract to discuss the findings, the unfolding of the contract and next steps in the update of the database, as well as the interim report. This exact date will be agreed upon with the contractor.

Another meeting with the Commission in Brussels will be organised to mark the closure of the contract and to present the conclusions of the work done.

#### **3.7.** Reporting and deliverables

The contractor will submit:

#### 1) Ad-hoc reports

Throughout the duration of the contract, the contractor is obliged, upon request of the Commission, to provide short (1, maximum 2 pages) ad hod reports, reflecting progress of the work during the period as indicated in the Commission's request, as well as report outstanding isues and questions (if any). The tenderer will submit the ad-hoc report in no later than 10 days after the Commission sent the request. The reports will be sent by e-mail to the Commission's contact person.

#### 2) Inception Report

No later than 15 working days after the kick-off meeting, the contractor will submit an inception report outlining the approach, coverage, format and contents of the database will be provided. The methodology, timetable and steps necessary to deliver each of the tasks will also

be provided. This report will be based the draft presented in the technical proposal as well as discussions during the kick-off meeting.

#### 3) Interim report

The draft interim report will be submitted at the latest 11 months after the entry into force of the contract and will include at minimum the report mentioned in Task 3.3 (3). Additionally, it shall present an overview and analysis of the changes and reforms that affected the RES certification/equivalent qualification schemes since the entry into force of the Renewable Energy Directive. A special focus should be given to mutual recognition aspects. The main conclusions gathered from the work carried out for the purpose of fulfilling Task 3.3 (2) – the database maintenance - should also be included.

#### 4) Final report

The draft final report will be submitted 22 months after the entry into force of the contract and will present a comprehensive overview and analysis, covering all aspects as described under 3.3 (3), of the changes and reforms that affected certification schemes or equivalent qualification schemes for installers of small-scale RES technologies monitored countries during the duration of the contract. The report will at minimum present all the conclusions of the work carried out during the contract. Best practices and recommendations for improving regulatory, legal and financial framework related to certification schemes or equivalent qualification schemes for installers of small-scale RES technologies in respective countries, as well as at EU level must be highlighted, the choice of best practices justified.

#### 3) Database maintenance

The tenderer will update the information for each country in the event of significant changes to national regimes or twice a year, whichever is the more frequent.

Significant changes to national regimes include amendments of laws regarding market access for RES installers, reforms of certification or equivalent qualification schemes, changes to the national mutual recognition procedures.

Such updates will be highlighted on the website and the Commission informed, in a manner to be agreed with the Commission, e.g. via an ad-hoc report as described under 3.7 (1).

#### **3.8.** Summary of meetings and deliverables

# 4. CONTENT AND GRAPHIC REQUIREMENTS OF THE FINAL DELIVERABLES
